

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Red Dress Day and MMIWG2+...

In Canada, we have an epidemic of missing and murdered Indigenous women, girls and two spirit people. Indigenous people have long called for action to stop the high rates of violence they face, but it wasn't until 2015, that the National Inquiry into MMIWG2+ had been launched. Indigenous communities across the Nation had been speaking out and calling for ______ for years, but had largely gone ignored.

The inquiry made it very clear that Canada has a problem, and that Indigenous women are ______ times more likely to go missing or be murdered than any other women in Canada. The high rates of violence towards Indigenous women, girls and two spirit people comes from an array of issues, such as intergenerational trauma, systemic racism, and transient workers just to name a few.

All Canadians need to take a stand and help to end the violence. The first step is truth and understanding. Now that you know about MMIWG2+ you can help educate others and spread ______. A few things you can do as a class is to hold a walk for MMIWG2+ and raise funds for Indigenous causes, hold a school wide assembly to speak about MMIWG2+ and invite Indigenous knowledge keepers to speak, and hang red dresses outside your school for red dress day.
